FROM FIRE CHIEF DAVIS

July was an eventful month for the Fire Department. With the hot and humid weather remaining, we continued staffing a Wellness Officer on each shift who monitors the firefighter's physical condition during emergency operations. The Wellness Officer is also responsible for rest and rehab operations on emergency scenes and the firefighters return to duty after the completion of each recovery cycle.

On Sunday, July 3, we did standby at Villa Point on Lake Hamilton for the Fireworks Display which went well.

Station 4 manning was also moved to station 6 so that the remodel and expansion of Station 4 could begin. The transition was smooth and we are still responding comparably quickly to all calls.

Lastly, we hired three Probational firefighters to replace our recently retired firefighters. We have been training them daily and look forward to what they can bring to the department.

The Fire Prevention Bureau conducted 115 inspections for July including 13 Certificate of Occupancies: Taylor Realty, Windmill Farms Storage Buildings, Bathhouse Dog Spa, Barretts Car Spa, Terry Lynn's Family Home Daycare, Five Tools Academy, BW's Studio, Hot Springs Counseling and Wellness, Shelter Insurance, Bart Bledsoe.

The Fire Prevention Bureau also ensured the safe training of the three probational firefighters: Osbel Angulo, Connor Braughton, and Jerry Ross.

- HSF D sponsored two Incident Command classes (ICS-300 and ICS-400) presented by the Arkansas Department of Emergency Management. Eleven HSF D personnel attended the ICS-300 class and six attend the ICS-400 class. These classes focused on Incident Command structure for expanding and complex incidents. Numerous other entities and fire departments attended the training.
- The FAA inspection for the Airport and ARFF (Airport Rescue & Fire Fighting) was conducted in July. This is an annual inspection that reviews ARFF responsibilities, training records, apparatus readiness/maintenance and incident response.
- Three new recruits began their HSF D Orientation in preparation for attendance at the Arkansas Fire Academy in August. Recruits were taught basic firefighting skills, reviewed firefighting equipment and learned general knowledge about HSF D. They also participated in normal company training and were introduced to live fire training at the Training Grounds.

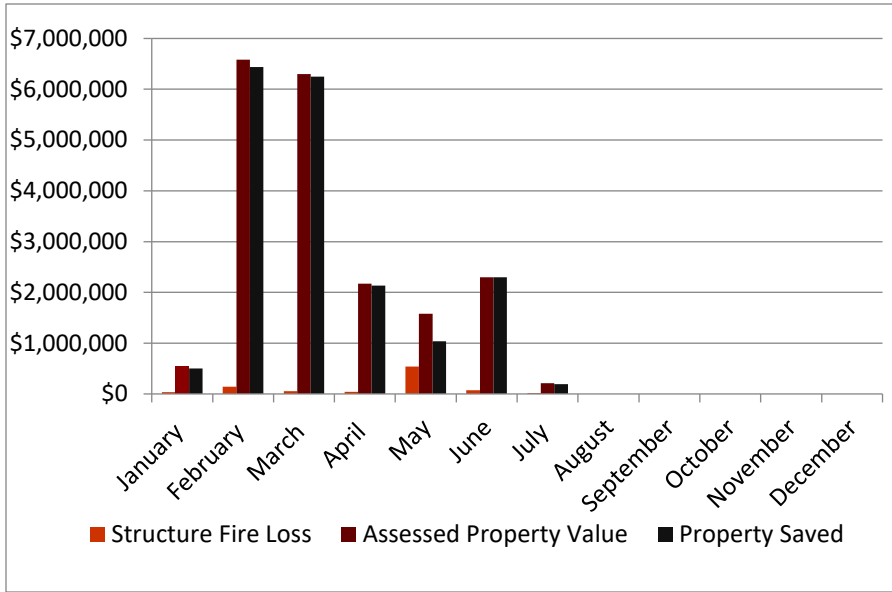

Structure fire loss through July 2022: \$899,037.

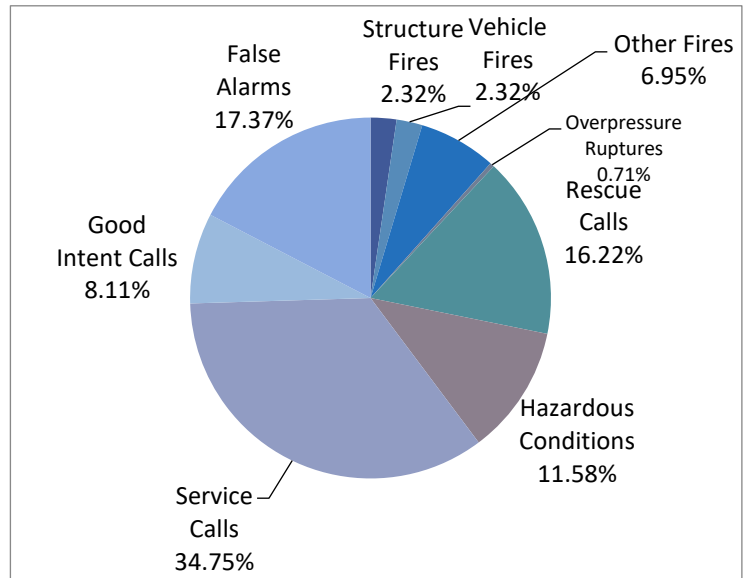
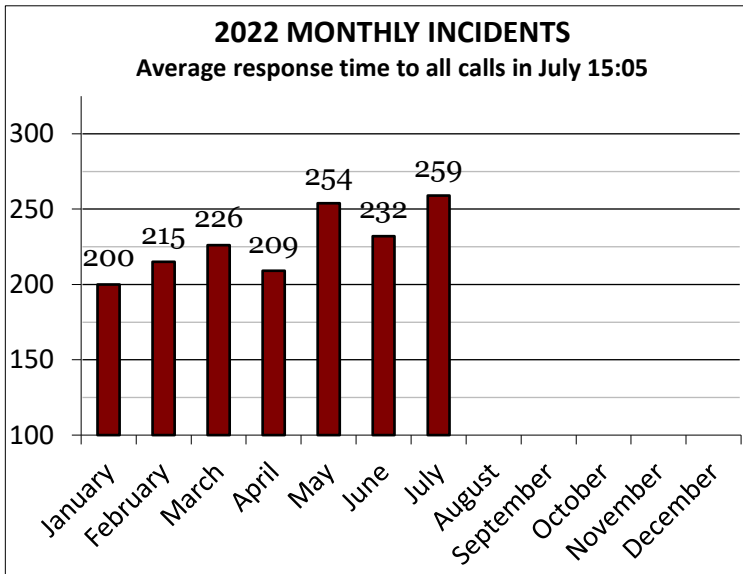
Total Property Saved through July 2022: \$18,844,510.

Average response time to structure fires in July 2022: 5:44.

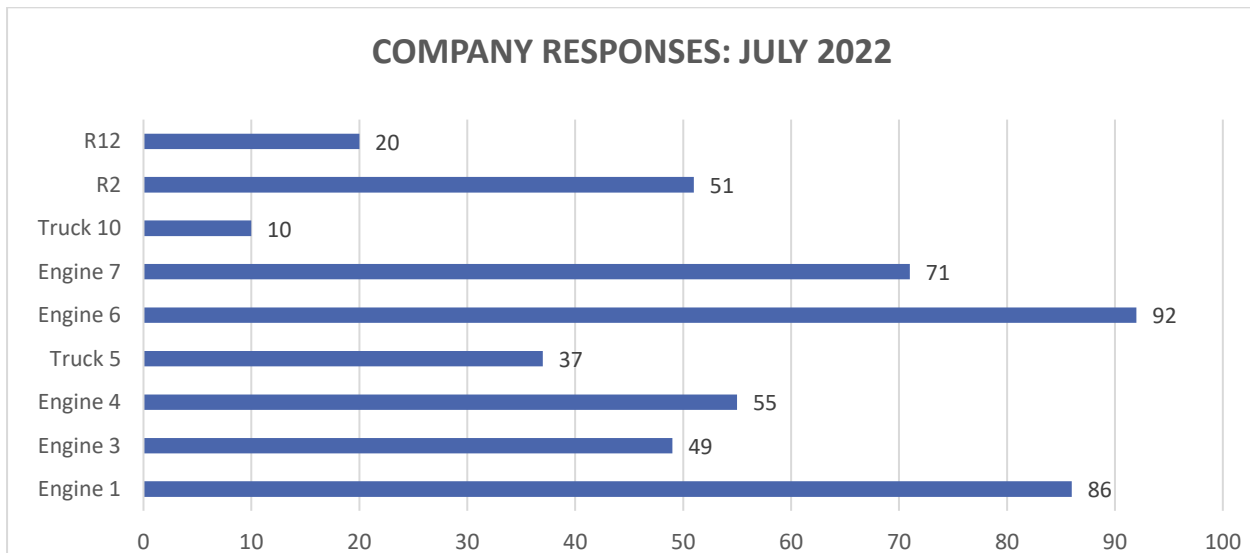


MONTHLY INCIDENT COUNTS

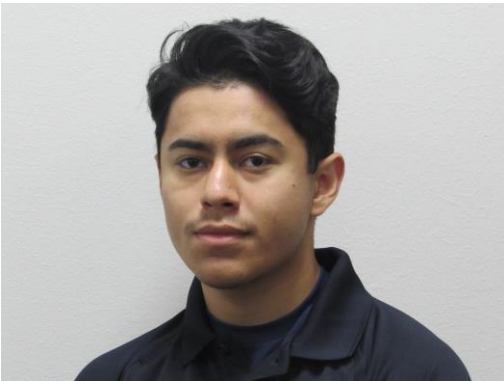
